Many of us take water for granted. There are millions of people around the world who lack access to clean water and basic sanitation, while we simply have to turn on the tap or flush the toilet. We forget that without clean water, OUR HEALTH, and our quality of life is at risk.

We also forget about the vast infrastructure beneath our feet and the dedication of water and wastewater professionals who work day and night to keep our water clean and sanitation services working.

Every few years the Council re-examines the city's needs for utility infrastructure and adopts Capital Improvement Plans to meet expected consumption trends and maintain compliance with regulations. In 2019, the City hired an outside consultant to review utility operating and capital expenses and make recommendations on future rate changes. An additional goal of a rate study is to produce a recommendation that smooths out the changes in rates as much as possible, minimizing the change in rates in any given year.

At the end of 2019, the Council adopted the consultant's recommended rate structure. This rate structure will allow us to keep our utilities functioning and make the necessary investments to ensure that our customers will not be left without critical utility services.

Why Are Our Utility Rates Increasing?



Utility bills for residential customers are estimated to increase by approximately \$7.17 per month. The base rate of water includes the first 100 cubic feet.

There are many projects planned to allow the City to stay in compliance with our regulators. These include:

- Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) requires the City to lower its water mains under state highway to new WSDOT Standards and remove the old pipes; 20-year projection to complete the project (\$60,000 / year).
- Implementing a chlorination system which creates chlorine on site from salt for water purification. (2023 project \$65,000)
- Calistoga Storm Water & 2016 Kansas Street Outfall Improvements (1.65 million).
- Waste Water Treatment Plant Solids Handling (2023 project of approximately \$12 million).
